cooperation in these important medical examinations. he has discussed this matter with the High Commissioner and other officials of the Trust Territory and feels that they are sympathetic to this approach. Dr. Conard further believes that a payment of about \$100 to each of the 157 Utirik people involved or their next descendant would constitute an acceptable amount and that such payment, if made, should be clearly identified as an "inconvenience payment" and disassociated completely from any idea of recompense for having been subjected to fallout radiation.

Because of the great importance that we place on the continuation of these examinations, we endorse Dr. Conerd's proposal; and the AEC is prepared to provide approximately \$16,000 for this purpose. We assume that, if approved, the funds would be made available by transfer to the Trust Territory for appropriate distribution to the individuals concerned:
