Dear Dr. Liverman:

This is a followup to the telephone conversation Mr. John E. deYoung of my staff had on June 9, 1976, with L. Joe Deal, Assistant Director for Field Operations, Division of Operational and Environmental Safety, on the urgency of obtaining laboratory analysis of food samples from Encu Island and an up-to-date report from the Department of Energy on the possible use of this island by the current residents of Bikini Island.

The residents officially have requested the Eigh Cormissioner to produce this information for them since they do not wish to leave Bikini Atell. You will recall that experimental food gardens were established by D.O.E. last autumn on Eneu Island. Some of the Bikini Island residents have been working in these experimental gardens and they cannot understand why D.O.E. doesn't have any results available, other than a compling of some 15 coconuts. Mr. Beal also in his testimony to the House Interior Appropriations Subcormittee at the May 22, 1975, hearing, referred to "food samples and other crops that are now in the pipeline being analyzed". He stated that the results would be out in a few months.

In view of the reluctance of the residents to leave Bikini Atoll, it is imperative that we furnish them and the Subcommittee an up-to-date analysis of the situation on Eneu Island within the next virty days. The Bikinians have asked the High Commissioner to delay a decision on the site for a temporary relocation until such an analysis is available.

Therefore, I am requesting that D.O.E. give this matter the highest of priorities. Representatives of the Bikinians will be present at the June 19, 1978, House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee hearing on Bikini, and this matter obviously will be raised at that time also.

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As you doubtless know, we have already taken the public position that Eneu is unsafe, and that it ought not to be used as an alternative to Eikini. With D.O.E.'s concurrence, I stated the following on May 22 before the House Appropriations Subcommittee:

The Committee will recall that when we testified before you a month ago, we anticipated, on the basis of the bast information then available to us from the Department of Energy, that if it were necessary to move the people of Bikini Island to an alternative, safe site, we could expect that the nearby island of Eneu would be available for that purpose. Last Thursday we learned that tests of a limited sample of foodstuffs growing on Eneu showed an uptake of radionuclides much in excess of those predicted on the basis of the known cesium and strontium centent of the soil. Accordingly, we have concluded that we must climinate Eneu as an alternative site".

"The test results reported by the Department of Energy lead the Interior Department and the Government of the Trust Territory to two conclusions: we must move all of the current residents of Dikini Island off that island, as quickly as we are able to do so; we must not move them to Encu, as had been the Bikinians, hope and ours.

If the foregoing conclusions concerning the unavailability of Eneu are not correct, we must know that fact promptly. The information we received from D.O.E. in May supported the above categorical statements. If there is any doubt from D.O.E.'s standpoint as to the conclusion stated concerning Eneu, we clearly need to know of it promptly. Any comments you can offer prior to our hearing scheduled for June 19 would be helpful. We shall hope to hear from you by then.
