Three people from Rougelap in the Marshall Islands of the Pacific have been brought to the andical research center of ARC's Brookhaven Mational Laboratory at Upton, Long Island, New York, for examination and treatment. They have modules in their thyroid glands which appear to be the result of exposure to fallout redistion from a unclass detonation 11 years ago.

A total of 82 people of Rongelap Atoll were socidentally exposed to fallout radiation from a thermosociest device tested on Narch 1, 1954. The sverage whole body exposure was approximately 175 reentgens, and additional amounts of radiation resulted from absorption of radioiodine in the thyroid glands. Since that time the D.S. Atomic Energy Commission and the Trust Territory of the Facific Islands have sponsored annual medical surveys of the exposed people. The surveys are carried out by a Brookhaven Mational Laboratory team, headed by Robert A. Conard, N.D.

Immediately after exposure the people were evacuated to Kunjalain Island for treatment and were subsequently on Majuro Atoli until 1957 when they ware returned to Rongelap. On their return to their home stoll the United States provided them with a new village and other facilities and services to essist their re-establishment. The current population of Rongelap is about 228 persons. On April 30, 1965, Congress appropriated \$950,000 as "compassionate relief" payment to the 82 persons who were exposed.

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Medical examination in March, 1964, revealed that three girls 13 to 14 years old had developed modules in their thyroid glands. Following surgery at the U.S. Maval Hospital on Guan, the girls were returned to Rongelap. The modules were not malignant. A medical report based on these appeared in a May, 1965, issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

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The three recent cases were detected in March, 1965. Two of thes are in boys 12 and 17 years old and the other in a wanne aged 41. The patients are being accompanied during their trip by Dr. John Isman, a Marshalless prectitioner, who will serve as interpreter. It is antisipated that the Marshall Islanders will be in this country only a month or so. They arrived in Heurshill country only a month or so. They arrived

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
