Excellency:

As Your Excellency is already well aware, various issues have been raised in this country over the thermonuclear bomb experiments conducted at Bikini this year, and consequently, I have the honor to mention below the wishes of the Government of Japan regarding thermonuclear bomb experiments which the Government of the United States of America may conduct in the future, and request that the Government of the United States of America give sufficient consideration to this matter.

1. The Government of Japan wishes that the Government of the United States will move the thermonuclear bomb testing grounds for 1954 to another location as far as is technically possible.

2. If it is absolutely impossible to take the above mentioned measure, it is requested that the scale of the experiments be maintained at a minimum and that sufficient consideration also be given to the results of the investigations conducted by the relevant Japanese authorities on the effects which this year's experiments had on fish, sea currents, weather conditions and so forth. It is also requested that complete precautionary measures be taken, especially so as not to endanger human lives, and that as one of such precautionary measures, the Government of Japan be given early notice concerning the following matters, prior to conduct of the experiments:

(1) The dates on which the experiments are to be conducted.

(2) The area of the danger zone and the period during which it is designated.

(3) Concrete precautionary measures to be taken.

3. It is requested that when a thermonuclear bomb experiment is held and a danger zone is thus designated, the Government of the United States of America issue sufficient compensation for losses naturally inflicted upon the Japanese fishing industry through such experiment /th: through deprivation of source of supply/ and in case unexpected damage is done to Japanese nationals, full compensation be made for all such dangers regardless of their locations.

It is added that the Government of Japan hopes that discussion will be held in quick order between the competent officers of both Governments regarding concrete measures to be taken for this issue.

I avail myself of this opportunity to renew to your Excellency the assurances of my highest consideration.
