Dear Shields:

In answer to your letter of August 3, 1949, Professor Latimer and I are more than willing to be of service in evaluating the problems presented to us by Mr. Deal. In order to assist us in appraising some of the factors involved, we both feel that it would be very useful if there could be made available to us the pertinent information concerning the fall-out of radioactivity following the Trinity, Japanese, Bikini, and Biniwetok detonations. Any additional data on the period of persistence of radioactive particles in the atmosphere following these episodes will also be useful.

The report left with us by Mr. Deal presents a number of highly provocative points, with some of which we found ourselves in agreement, and concerning others, we felt a little differently than did Mr. Smith. However, he is certainly to be congratulated on having handled a difficult problem very well.

You no doubt will agree with us that the biological aspects of the situation are loaded with a great many intangibles but Professor Latimer and I hope to have our joint report in your hands by the middle of next month.
