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Doar Lloyd:

Dr. Edward E. Held of the University of Washington has returned from his latest survey trip to Bikini with seme information that, if confirmed, could slow down the program to return the people to that atoll.

Dr. Hold was unable to check the facts and neither have I. But he said he heard the same story both on Bikini and in Honolulu. Briefly, these are his points:

1. Inforior equipment is being used in the atell cleanup being coordinated by the Defense Atemic Supply Agency (DASA). Landing craft being used for across-the-lageen transportation are in such bed condition that the Navy crews are unable to keep them operating, despite all-out efforts by the cremen themselves.

Dr. Hold said the Navy even worked all night to get the engine operating on one of the beats, only to have the steering mechanism break down a few beat-lengths from the dock. As a result of the continual breakdowns, Dr. Hold's party was unable to visit some inlands along the atoll's western rim. Consequently, one member of the survey team will have to return to Bikini later to visit these islands.

Dr. Hold said construction equipment furnished by DASA to Holmos & Marvor, the contractor, is in such peer condition that work has been slowed down.

Due to lack of Army cooperation, the Bikini program is being supported out of Hickan Field rather than nearby Kwjalein. The story that Dr. Hold picked up from personnel on Bikini was that DASA had approached Kwajalein directly for cooperation—and was premised full cooperation. However, orders later came from Redstone Arsonal, Alabama, that Kwajalein support be extended only for emergencies. Dr. Held was told that individuals at Kwajalein still de all they can, but on an "under the table" basis.

This situation must be adding to the cost of the clean-up being financed by the Department of the Defense and the Atenic Energy Commission. But it would be even more corious if the policy was continued into the time when the Trust Territory Government takes over.

In my opinion, the second problem is petentially mere serious than the first.

I would approcdate receiving any information you can turn up on these matters.
