IV. FUTURE STEPS TO AVOID FURTHER HARM TO SECURITY OF PSYCHOLOGICAL STRATEGY PLAN

1. Timing of public announcement after KING
 - a. Judgment of AFOAT on dangers from standpoint of aiding LRD of USSR
2. Measures before and after KING to stop possible leaks
 - a. Should task force personnel be held at Eniwetok for 24-- 48-- 72 hours or longer?
 - b. Should dispatch of mail be held up and if so for how long?
 - c. Any special instructions on debriefing for returnees?

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3. What character of public statement on security importance of letters; what method of issuing such a statement if it should be made?
4. Coordination between AEC and DOD of disciplinary or punitive steps on leaks
5. Liaison with DOD on reaching agreement concerning each agency's views of security objectives, measures and results.
