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Memo to Dr. CNE

Subject Medical Studies of the Marshall Islands Accidentally Exposed to Fallout (RPIIS No. 000032)

I would like you to consider preparing a reevaluation of the research character of subject program, and, if uncurred in ~~the~~ same, ~~to~~ to have this program transferred back into OTER/JIAD.

I would say that it is more-or-less an article of faith that any human case of overexposure to external radiation or radioactive materials becomes a case for research, simply because our knowledge of inhibition effects in human subjects is woefully lacking. In this respect, numbers don't enter into the decision whether or not medical follow-up/evaluation/treatment (if necessary) represents research or "simple" medical care. In other words, epidemiologic considerations are not the only factor in determining the scientific research character, such as in the case of large-populations exposed to low-level radiation.

In the case of the conglomerate of activities, loosely known as the Marshall Islands (M.I.) program, there is no question that some of these activities have a ~~research~~ service, rather than a research character. The medical part, however, i.e., the part that concerns the Marshallese exposed to fallout radiation on March 1, 1954, and covering ~~the~~ persons inhabiting Ailingine, Ujae, and Rongelap at that time, plus an equally large group acting as controls (altogether about 600 people)
