Dear Doctor :

Your institution has participated in providing definitive surgical care for those Marshall Island natives accidentally exposed to fallout radiation in 1954 and who developed thyroid tumors.

The Medical Department, Brookhaven National Laboratory, has been responsible for the medical and scientific aspects of the study and care of radiation effects in this population. For medical, scientific, and legal reasons, it is necessary to have a central repository of all pertinent medical records at Brookhaven to provide ready access to medical and to legal review. The development of thyroid neoplasms has been a serious sequelae of the radiation exposure. It is essential that these materials be assembled in one place.
